


The Police committee met November 19 to consider the next steps, particularly how to raise the funds needed to build the new station. As Officer Sanctuary arrived, he announced he was on standby because one of his officers was in the field and he could be called for backup. He further said: "today would have been a good day for people to see why we need a new station. I was having a meeting with two other chiefs; an officer was trying to finish paperwork and another officer had two arrestees, one of whom kept trying to get away." This was going on all in the same room. "And our sally ports were full of impounded vehicles- two motorcycles, 4 wheelers and cars."

That is a graphic illustration of why we need a new station. That single room is the work room, the lunchroom, the room where drugs are handled, the meeting room —- too crowded with no privacy for anyone. (The two folks arrested were later transported to jail, if you are curious).

We have an agreed upon design for the new workspace which has private, soundproof interview rooms, safe holding rooms, a separate lunchroom, private offices, storage and a reasonable sized training room which can double as a community room.

Now, we need a grant writer who can help us research federal grants, foundations or sources will fund a new building with a safe environment for our police department. We are searching but perhaps one of you, reading this, knows someone we don't. We have spoken with other departments with new stations to ask how they were funded. So, far, the answer is "we were bonded".

Walpole will be asked to approve a bond for this new station, but the committee is committed to make an effort to raise half of the seven-million-dollar cost with grants or local fund raising. Any ideas?



Wreath making has been cancelled this year because of construction.

Have you heard our news? The Hooper Institute is about to begin a building renovation. The dream is coming true with an accessible building and a lift to each floor. The plan is to have a new community kitchen, ready for new classes, meals together

and more. We are updating the plumbing, expanding the bathrooms, modernizing the utilities, the dirt basement, and tightening up the building to at long last evict the critters that make the Institute their home. There will be more to report on as the work begins and continues well

into 2025. There will be Camp next summer, there will be Woodworking, and there will be the school gardens and the school programs. There will be expansion of our staff, board volunteers and a Friends of Hooper revival. Our mission and vision continues and remains strong.







### Did You Know That...?

Explorations into Walpole People, Places & History with Ray Boas

....when asked a tough question in the summer of 1897, Philip O'Hanlon's answer did not satisfy his eight-year old daughter, so he suggested she write the *New York Sun*, one of New York City's most prominent newspapers, and ask them. "If the *Sun* knows, they will tell you," he told her, "but do not be disappointed if the busy paper does not reply."

Virginia's request was simple, and her original note survives. "Dear Editor, I am eight years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says 'If you see it in the Sun it's so.' Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus? Virginia O'Han-

Reading the paper for months looking for an editorial reply to her letter, she was about to give up, but finally, on September 21, 1897, the *Sun* published their reply, "Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus"

Known for its anonymous editorials, after the death in 1906 of its publisher Francis Pharcellus Church, it was disclosed that he wrote the 416-word response answering Virginia's question. Possibly initially overlooked at the paper, the reply was written in an afternoon and appeared early in the school year in New York City. The editorial was printed in the paper's third and last column of editorials that day, along with comments on a newly invented chain-less bicycle and "British Ships in American Waters". Soon the editorial was republished elsewhere. The Sun did not reprint it until 1905, and then reprinted it every year from 1924, until the paper ceased publication in 1950. Readers requested copies from the Sun, and the paper sent out over 200,000 copies by 1936.

In 1921 a book was written adapted from the editorial. NBC wrote a cantata in 1932. In the 1940s radio waves carried the letter and editorial reply at holiday time. Adaptations were made into films, and an animated television special won the 1975 Emmy for outstanding Children's Special. Shared and reprinted and reprinted, now, in December 2024, the *CLARION* is proud to join those republishing, "Yes Virginia, There is a Santa Claus."



Our homes are our refuges from the world. May yours be snuggly and warm during these darkest days of the year. It's no surprise our houses can also be a refugia for wildlife. At least my old house is. It's warmth is attractive to many creatures, offering shelter from the vagaries of the weather, and often protection from predators.

Tucked in the crevices around windows and doors are lady bugs and maybe a squash bug or two. Cocoons of moths are fastened under the eaves while torpid spiders are wedged between crevices of the siding. Under our granite steps a chipmunk lies curled, secure from the cold world outside. There is always the unwelcome incursion of white-footed mice into the basement.

Another denizen of some homes are flying squirrels. While normally cavity dwellers in trees, your attic or outbuilding might suit them as well. We have two species of these tree



squirrels in New Hampshire. The northern (Glauomys sabrinus) and the southern (G. volans) flying squirrels are small mammals about the size of a chipmunk. They weigh just a few ounces. Both are very well camouflaged with a mantle of brown fur and white underbellies.

The smaller southern flying squirrel, at 8 to 10 inches long, is more common in Walpole. They prefer our abundant crops of oak acorns and hickory nuts. The larger northern flying squirrel prefers higher elevation coniferous forests and seeds. They are considered much rarer.

Besides nuts and fruit from trees and shrubs, flywill eat plant buds and flowers. Mushrooms are a favorite, even the underground filaments or mycorrhizae. They are also omnivores, consuming wood-boring beetles, bird eggs, nestlings and carrion.

Flying squirrels forage under cover of darkness. With their huge black eyes, they see well at night. The darkness offers some protection from predators, unless the predator is also suited to night life. Owls, raccoons, bobcats and domestic cats take their toll on the population. They are clumsy on the ground where they are the most vulnerable.

Flying squirrels communicate using ultrasonic frequencies, akin to echolocation. It's thought to be inaudible to predators. They also produce squeaky notes that sound like birdsongs to our ears, including whistles and trills.

Their winter dens are located about 20 feet off the ground in a cavity chiseled by a woodpecker or a rotted hole in a mature tree such as an old sugar maple. In winter, whole family groups will cuddle up in the den to conserve heat. They disburse in the summer and create their own

leafy nests to raise their many offspring.


When it's time to travel from the den for a foraging expedition, flying squirrels soar into action. We have all heard they don't actually fly. Rather, they are able to glide using their patagium. This fur covered flap of skin stretches between front and rear feet, giving the animal a square, kitelike shape in flight.

Flying squirrels maneuver very efficiently using their flat tails like a rudder. They can even make 90 degree turns mid-air. The average glide is 6-10 yards but over 20 yards has been recorded. Before impact with the incoming tree, the squirrel flips up its tail to put on the brakes. This raises the front of the body, creating

a
parachute
effect. It's ready for a
four footed landing. The
squirrel immediately runs to
the back side of the tree to avoid
predators, then scurries upward to
launch again.

Although rarely visible to us, know that these beautiful little animals are doing their part to enrich the health of mature forests. They disburse seeds, nuts and even spread mushroom spores in their feces. As both predator and prey, they are another link in the food web of the forest ecosystem, adding to its wildlife diversity.

#### **Zombie Run**



# Young Writers Competition

Young Writers is an organization that hosts several competitions every year for students. They offer different competitions for students in middle and high school and another for younger students. The organization is a nonprofit based in New England, so the schools that participate are typically from New Hampshire, Vermont, and Massachusetts.

The competition that Walpole Elementary School students have the opportunity to compete in is typically for 10-18 year olds. There is a different theme for each competition.For example, in the past, there were the competitions of Hunted and Trapped. Students had the freedom to express their stories within that theme how they wanted to interpret it. However, you can't use as many words as you want; you can only use 100 words or less. If you meet the age requirements and the story follows the theme and has 100 words or less, you can send it in. If your story is good enough, it will be published into a book full of other stories made by other students around New England. If you're stuck or not great at coming up with ideas for a story, you do not have to fear. They provide you with story starters to help and graphic organizers to put down your ideas prior to writing out your story. Several Walpole students have gotten published in these books over the last eight years. The most recent competition, which concluded on November 1st, was titled "Fright Night," and students had to write a flash fiction horror story of their choice. Sixteen students sent in their work to Young Writers and are currently awaiting to hear back to see if they were selected for publication.


